

Your Library in the Community

"To serve the community as well as possible, it is important for the Library staff to be actively involved in the community." — Director Diana Brown

You're not imagining it—if you think you've seen Library staff members delivering books to an elderly neighbor, marching in a St. Patrick's day parade, at the train station re-stocking the "Rack at the Track," or attending community organization meetings. These are a few examples of how our staff is involved in the community.

Our Outreach Services Department delivers library materials to those with mobility or vision issues as well as to seniors who are homebound or in senior facilities. Anyone who is temporarily or permanently disabled

is eligible for home delivery. Outreach Services also assists homebound patrons in registering to vote, and maintains paperback swaps with reading materials at the Salvation Army, La Huerta Supermarket and local apartment complexes.



The Library van and staff are a familiar sight at the St. Charles Farmer's Market, Pride of the Fox Riverfest and the Scarecrow Fest. Be sure to stop by to meet with staff members, find out what's new and to spin the Library wheel!

Many individual staff members are actively involved in community organizations. Assistant Director Bryan Wood has been a member the Noon Rotary Club of St. Charles for 12 years and volunteers at Club events. Outreach Services Manager Jean Langlais has been a member of the

St. Charles Breakfast Rotary for five years and has helped collect coats for the Salvation Army to distribute to children at Christmas, served meals at Lazarus House and sorted food at the Northern Illinois Food Bank.

Bonni Ellis, Circulation Services Manager, serves as a Literacy Volunteers Fox Valley board member, and is an Altrusa board member, chairing the Service Committee. Altrusa is an international service organization with a focus on literacy, women and children. Librarian Sue Glad serves on the St. Charles Heritage Center Board. She helps coordinate programs that are cosponsored with the Library.

Young Adult Librarian Marianne Weick has been a St. Charles Youth Commissioner since 1997. Commissioners are appointed by the Mayor. Marianne notes that, "It offers a great opportunity to network with other community members who work

A Library for the Community

The St. Charles Public Library is preparing a new strategic plan to guide the development of its services and facilities. The outlook will be long-term, but the immediate focus will be on what steps to take within the next three years. The plan will be based on an understanding of the community, its needs and the Library's role within the community.

Last year, we asked you to evaluate specific services the Library offers and to give us an idea of how to improve them. Results included requests for more e-books and other electronic resources, a better website, better parking and expanded weekend hours. We have substantially increased our e-book collection and added new electronic resources and services, expanded and standardized summer Sunday hours and begun construction of a new parking lot. In 2012/2013, we will work on making our website more user-friendly.

This fall, we again are asking for your opinions. This time, there are fewer questions and they are more general:

- 1. What do you see as the most important needs in the St. Charles Community?
- 2. In your opinion, how could the Library address these needs?

The questions will be online, and you may answer them from your home computer or from a computer in the Library at **www.scplfuture.org** now through September 15.

New this time will be two public meetings for people to gather and exchange ideas about the issues: Thursday, September 20 from 7:00–8:30 p.m. and Sunday, September 23 from 2:00–3:30. p.m. We hope you can attend.

For over a century, the Library has been a community gathering and information place. Today, it serves more than 55,000 people with both traditional and electronic resources. Your responses will help the Library evolve so that it will continue to fulfill its role as a vital and forward-looking community resource.





Foundation Landscape Project


